FOREWORD

This cumulative index has been compiled by approximately fifty students in the School of Librarianship, University of California, Berkeley, over a two-year period. The Editor and the reader owe them their sincere appreciation for much careful work above and beyond the call of duty in a class in book selection. Especial thanks are due to George W. Sloan, now at the Library of Congress, for organizing and supervising a team of students to guide the index through the final editing process. Without his enthusiastic interest, organizational ability, and dedication, this index would not have seen print.

The index is primarily a geographical one; standardizatioa and checking of entries is complete only for geographical entries. All titles have been indexed (article titles are in quotes; titles of books, periodicals, newspapers, and motion pictures are in italics). Newspapers have been placed under their generic titles with references from the place of publication in order to group many such publications together. All sources for articles in the *Newsletter* have been indexed, except those directly from dispatches of international press services.

This index begins with the March 1952 Newsletter (entitled News Notes on Intellectual Freedom). It includes one edition of the November 1952 Newsletter, but not the second. Both editions had the same information but different paging. The accuracy of the page citations for this issue will therefore depend largely upon which edition is being used.

University libraries and presses are listed under place if they have the same name as the place in which they are located. Otherwise, they are listed under their distinctive name. Names of local organizations are indexed only under the place in which they are located; e.g., Committees on Decent Literature may be found under many local listings but not under any one main entry.

The price of \$5.00 includes this Part I, 1952–1962, and Part II, 1963–1965, to be published in the Spring of 1966. Subsequent annual indexes, beginning with calendar year 1966, will be included in the *Newsletter* subscription price.
